When she and her husband, Garrick Tiplady, took on the renovation of the main floor of their Edwardianera Toronto house, designer Sarah Richardson had to take this into account, along with the fact that the couple and their two-year-old son, Oscar, frequently entertain friends and their large extended families.

"They love to entertain, and they like to keep things sleek, clean and modern," says Richardson. "So I found myself thinking of the simplicity of a large-scale catering kitchen with maximum countertop and storage space." The solution for what became an 850-square-foot kitchen and sitting room was found in a monumental, 10-foot-long island topped with "the largest slab of grey marble we could find," says Richardson. A seamless bank of custom, lab-style cabinetry under the sink and stovetop and flanking the refrigerator and ovens provides reams of storage and banishes any clutter.

The most notable item on display is the couple's double-door

stainless steel wine fridge. "The only thing we knew for sure was that we had to find space for our wine fridge," laughs Garrick, who enjoys sharing his collection of 150 bottles (which he calls a "sneeze" by true collectors' standards) with friends and family.

And yet the rigorously minimalist kitchen, like its owners, is both warm and inviting. The simplicity of the design is tempered by the choice of subtly different yet harmonious materials. The backsplash - an elegant tone-on-tone grid of different-sized Carrara marble tiles in a warm dove grey — is a fitting counterpoint to the crisp stainless steel countertop around the sink. Pendant canisters of soft pebbled glass and steel provide stylish task lighting and vertical interest. Narrow, elegant open shelves hold the couple's collection of fine glassware and cookery books. Says Richardson, "What makes this very modern kitchen work from a design perspective is that we took a streamlined approach but used a variety of interesting materials."
